1. What's Happening on Campus?

- Jim Greenwood, 60, associate professor of communication at UF since 1981, died at his home May 29. He served as chair of the Division of Fine Arts for 12 years, was adviser to the campus radio station, WLFC-FM, for more than a decade and taught courses in public speaking, broadcasting and debate. He currently was the adviser for Lambda Pi Eta, the communication honorary society. He also served as parliamentarian for the Faculty Senate, Graduate Council and the University's College of Liberal Arts. He is survived by his parents, two brothers and two sisters. Burial was in Naperville, Ill., and a memorial service will be held on campus after classes resume in the fall, with details announced at a later date.

- **Barbara A. Petti** studied voice as a teenager at the Cleveland Institute of Music and continued her studies at the Eastman School of Music. She earned bachelor's degrees at both Northwestern University and Bowling Green State University. She and her husband, Nick, moved to Findlay in 1961, where she became involved in the arts through the Findlay Light

- **Allen P. Dudley** (1919-1983) began his own dance band after graduating from the Oberlin Conservatory of Music in 1942. During World War II, he served in the U.S. Coast Guard and performed as a pianist and musical arranger for the Armed Forces Radio Services. Fondly known as the "music man," Dudley began his career in Findlay as program director for WFIN radio station, where he had his own 15-minute daily piano and talk show. In the late 1950s, Dudley organized the Summer Concert Series at Riverside Park, and after his death, the band shell there was named in his honor. He also worked for The Findlay Publishing Co. where he eventually became vice president. Dudley was a member of the Findlay Area Chamber of Commerce and its Ambassadors Club, Civic Music Association, Findlay Kiwanis Club, Findlay College Associates and also served on the board of directors of the Toledo Symphony Orchestra. Dudley was married to Ruth Campbell, and she died in April. Dudley's daughter, Sue Whitehouse, and son, David Dudley, accepted their father's award.

• **Inez O'Brien Senn** has been involved in music in Findlay for more than 50 years. In the late 1940s, she began performing as the vocalist with the Findlay Musical Trio, which included Mary O'Brien Child as narrator and first Mary Snyder Kirk as pianist and then Allen P. Dudley. Each year, they prepared a new show, usually based on a Broadway musical. According to Senn, Dr. Aletha Herwig, professor of history and director of student affairs at Findlay College, heard the group perform. Herwig then invited the Allen Dudley Trio to entertain at the final convocations each year for the next 11 years. She and her husband, Dr. Loren Senn, have been generous supporters of the performing arts in Findlay and at The University of Findlay.

2. Academic Update

- The College of Liberal Arts recently awarded its first student leadership awards to three seniors. Christen Mathern, Jenna Wasserman and Linda Davison were selected because they exemplify the college’s motto: “Learn to Lead.”
 - **Mathern**, a theatre major, received the Campus Leader Award for her participation as president of Alpha Psi Omega, an honorary theater fraternity. In that role, she added a strong service component to the group and led the fraternity’s first completely student-produced play.
 - A law and the liberal arts major, **Wasserman** received the Leader of Tomorrow Award. She was the Student Government Association’s first female president and made significant constitutional changes that enhanced the equitable distribution of funds across student groups. She also was instrumental in organizing the Sociology Club.
 - **Davison** was awarded the Scholar of Leadership Award. As a religious studies major, Davison wrote an in-depth paper on the Biblical character of Deborah. In addition, she explored the role of women in the ministry, specifically among African-Americans, Mennonites and Episcopalians.
- A bus full of history was parked on The University of Findlay campus May 18. Sponsored by UF’s department of history, law and political science, the BUS-eum 2 carried the exhibit, “VANISHED: German-American Civilian Internment, 1941-48.” Operated by the TRACES Center for History and Culture, a Midwest/World War II history museum in Saint Paul, Minn., BUS-eum 2 is touring eight eastern Midwest states in partnership with regional and state historical societies, state librarians/library associations and humanities councils. The exhibit tells the stories of 15,000 German-American civilians imprisoned by the U.S. government during World War II, not one of whom had legal representation, was charged with or tried for or convicted of a war-related crime. The Midwest was the site for 18 of the U.S. government’s 60 camps and centers. For more information, [click here](#).

• The University's Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) team traveled to Dallas, Texas, May 6 through 8 to compete in the SIFE National Exposition. The team earned the chance to compete at the national level by winning first place in its league at the SIFE USA regional competition in Chicago, Ill., in March. "Although the team did not win at nationals, they did a fantastic job and delivered a flawless presentation," said Gregory Arburn, Ph.D., director of finance, economics and SIFE. The presentation outlined the variety of outreach projects the team worked on during the past year, such as conducting an ethics workshop for students at Upper Sandusky High School and teaching middle school students about business. Teams shared the impact made in their communities through five educational topics: market economics, success skills, entrepreneurship, financial literacy and business ethics. - The University of Findlay, Eastern Kentucky University, East Tennessee State University, NorthWest Arkansas Community College and Iowa Central Community College announced the formation of the Rural Domestic Preparedness Consortium (RDPC) May 1. The consortium comprises academic partners that possess extensive and unique capabilities relating to rural emergency preparedness training as well as other strategic partners with technical expertise that will assist the RDPC in supporting a national training program. For the first year of the grant cycle, UF's School of Environmental and Emergency Management (SEEM) is developing four courses. Since March 2006, as the consortium was being formed, RDPC facilitated the training of more than 600 rural emergency responders by delivering or hosting all-hazards preparedness training courses. In the coming years, as the consortium becomes fully operational, it is anticipated to train thousands more rural emergency responders across the nation. For more information, [click here](#).

in Taipei, Taiwan. Tomo visited Wendy in Taiwan for several days in February for the Chinese New Year, and Wendy vacationed in Japan in April when she visited Tomo and his parents and attended the cherry blossoms festival in Okayama, Japan.

- There's no secret to getting students to learn, but for **Todd Helline '04, M '05** there is a trick to it. Helline, who just completed his first year of teaching, has already been named Greater Cincinnati Teacher of the Year. He teaches four seventh grade language arts classes at Bridgetown Middle School in the Cincinnati Oak Hills School District. One of his students nominated him for the honor. Helline uses a variety of sleight-of-hand and card tricks to capture the attention of his students at the beginning of each class. Helline credited James Schmidt, UF assistant professor of mathematics, for inspiring him. "Every class that I went to in math with Mr. Schmidt, I knew he'd have some type of game or trick or some type of fun activity to get class started. It just made it so that people loved going to his class. I knew that I wanted my classes to be that way. So I went home for Christmas, and my dad and I picked up some magic videos. We practiced on each other and learned all these different tricks," he explained. He also singled out Ben Sapp, instructor of education, as serving as a role model. "They really taught me that the key to teaching/learning is having fun and enjoying it," he said. Helline received his bachelor's degree in middle childhood education in 2004 and earned his master of arts in education from The University of Findlay in 2005, while serving as a graduate assistant coach for the UF baseball team. A native of Massillon, Ohio, Helline is married to **Allison (Golding '05)**, who is a UF nuclear medicine technology graduate, and whose siblings are **Troy Golding '06, Jenny (Golding) Scherer '01** and **Bryan Golding '99**. "Give them a smile and something to enjoy," Helline said of his students, "and you're almost guaranteed to get them to listen to you and learn." It's just like magic.

5. Oiler Sports

- The University of Findlay men's and women's outdoor track and field teams wrapped up the 2007 NCAA Division II National Championships on May 26 in Charlotte, N.C. The women finished 36th at the event with seven points, while the men took 42nd with four points. On the men's side, Kendell Simon earned all-American honors for the first time in his career in the 800-meter run, finishing fifth with a time of 1:50.82. For the women, Findlay's 4 x 400-meter relay team of Danielle Grochowalski, Abbie Shook, Pamela Bullock and Stephanie Charnigo took fifth with a school record-breaking time of 3:43.23 to capture all-American honors. Shook placed seventh in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:13.77, and Grochowalski placed eighth in the 400-meter hurdles at 1:01.76, both earning all-American honors.

- The men's soccer team has added 19 new student-athletes to its 2007 squad as head coach Andy Smyth announced his recruiting class on June 4. The team will be receiving two goalkeepers, six defenders, six midfielders and five forwards. "We are excited about the quality of this recruiting class," said Smyth. "Some of these players will be able to come in and contribute right away and help our program get back to winning ways, while others will have one year to grow into our system and help the program in the future."

- Junior Eric Atsma was selected to the 2007 all-Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference team on May 18. Atsma, from Grand Rapids, Mich., was named to the first team for the third consecutive season as the teams were selected by each player's stroke average in his 10 best rounds of league play, including the GLIAC Championships. Atsma, who had the second best scoring average in the rankings for the all-GLIAC teams at 72.3, led the Oilers for the season by winning three events. Senior Kirk Stucke and sophomore Kory Kotterman also earned all-conference recognition, each receiving honorable mention.

Eric Atsma was named to the 2007 all-GLIAC team for the third time.
