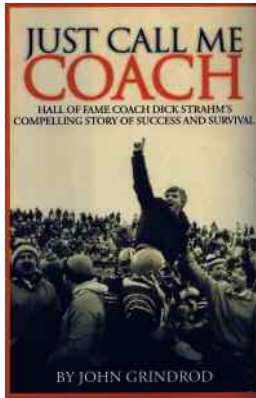

William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board. Carter will work with Dr. Sanjay Khanal to develop and expand the number of courses Kathmandu University offers in occupational health. The university has a well-developed environmental science program and seeks to strengthen its emerging occupational health program. 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4. Alumni Spotlight

- **Robert '69** and **Karen (Angel '70, M '92) Minto** had productive careers in education before they retired in 2000 and 2003 respectively. Now, they are finding success again by turning hobbies into businesses. Operating out of their farm in rural Mount Cory, they run Fallen Willow Pottery and a horse-breeding business.

Married for 42 years, they enjoy time together and working on their tidy four-acre farm located at 2151 Union Township Road west of Findlay. Their property includes their home, two barns and a former tool shed converted into a pottery studio and gallery. Although they are

now in their early 60s, they are invigorated by the new challenges and are physically fit from the hard work required to care for the horses and in producing the pottery.

Bob called making pottery “addicting.” His transformed tool shed contains several potter’s wheels, a spray booth, glazing area, kiln and a showroom. The kiln is more than seven feet tall and five feet wide. He produces art pottery in all sizes and shapes, from diminutive cups and bowls to pitchers, lidded jars, teapots, large vases and more. Although he produces functional pottery that is safe to use, individual pieces vary from practical to whimsical, each one distinctive in design.

More than just shaping objects on the potter’s wheel, the production process includes 41 steps, Bob pointed out. The clay pieces are then baked in his gas-fired kiln for 12 hours, which requires constant monitoring. He keeps meticulous records of how the kiln was loaded, the date, the time, the temperature outside, the weather – all variables that can impact how the pieces turn out. “I’m a studio potter. I’m not a production potter,” Bob remarked. “Every one of my pots is individual, so you’re buying a piece of artwork, and it’s one-of-a kind.”

Bob and Karen attend juried craft fairs and can be found at shows in Ohio, Michigan and Indiana. Karen noted that people who are interested in buying pottery may call or stop by their farm, as she and Bob are almost always home because of their responsibilities for caring for the horses. They also have a Web site at <http://www.fallenwillowpottery.com> where his work can be seen and purchased and one promoting the horses at <http://www.aqhaHotImpulse.com>.

Karen developed a love of horses as a child, learning to ride as a teenager. She and Bob bought their farm in 1973 and gradually got into the horse business. In 2003, they purchased Hot Impulse, a world champion stallion, with their friends Tom and Sandy Brown. “He had just finished his world championship, and he had just had a couple of offspring win futurities, so his name was coming into prominence at that time, and ever since then, it’s been climbing and climbing,” Bob commented. Hot Impulse is listed as number 10 of the top 350 sires in the country. He is stabled at Gumz Farms in Morganfield, Ky., a state-of-the-art facility, Bob said. The Mintos trailer their mares to Kentucky for breeding and then bring them back to Ohio for the 11-month gestational period. Then they return the horses to Kentucky to foal out.

Three brood mares are now at their farm, along with a 2-year-old and two yearlings. Two older mares, past reproductive stage, are living out their lives in comfort at the farm. Under foot are 10 friendly barnyard cats that scamper between the stalls. Bob said that young horses are like children and have to be taught their manners to be manageable, a job that falls to him. Karen is involved with their daily care. Bob also is in charge of promotion and advertising for the horse business, called Bob and Tom LLC.

The Mintos’ ties to The University of Findlay are strong, as they have sent horses to be trained by students in the UF equestrian program; by their longtime friends, Steve Brown, who is director of UF’s western equestrian program and Clark Bradley, UF instructor of western riding; and by Brian ’01 and Darla (Halbe ’01) Lee, UF equestrian graduates who are involved in training and showing horses.

Bob and Karen are both originally from the Cleveland area, but they met when they came to Findlay College. They were unusual in that they married before they graduated. As a consequence of marriage, Karen lost all of her financial aid. Both worked numerous jobs to get through school, and both graduated on time.

Bob majored in business, but then switched to art. He credited his high school teachers in Parma for giving him a good foundation in art. Several art professors who taught briefly at Findlay College in the late 1960s, such as Jack Mason, Alfred Olson and Marjorie Moench, Bob called “a treasure chest of intellect in the arts.” In addition, he served as president of Alpha Rho Tau, the fraternity for art majors and minors, and he was a member of Alpha Sigma Phi fraternity.

In succeeding years, Bob earned graduate credit in pottery and photography from Bowling Green State University, and he received a master of science in secondary education from the University of Dayton. His first job was teaching art for kindergarten through 12th grade for Ada (Ohio) School, and he stayed at Ada for 32 years, teaching from 1969 until 1995 and serving as principal of the high school for six years from 1995 until he retired in 2000.

Within six years of his arrival at Ada, Bob's students were getting recognition. At the northwest Ohio scholastic show in 1975, Ada students captured four out of five top awards, with succeeding generations of students continuing to make their mark. His students also consistently ranked in the top 10 in the state for the Governor's Show. Ada students went on to study at prestigious art schools across the country, many on scholarship, he said. Among his students was Ed Corle, associate professor of art, who has taught at The University of Findlay since 1986. Bob also coached football at Ada, primarily at the junior high level. He said he felt it was important to form relationships with students outside of the classroom.

At Findlay College, Karen was intensely interested in English, and she took all the courses she could. She was a student assistant for Dr. James Congleton for two years and benefited from classes taught by Dr. William Wagner, Dr. Richard Gebhardt, Helen Reimund and Barbara Smith. She also took Spanish courses and was influenced by Dr. Jean Nye. Karen returned to The University of Findlay and was in the second class to graduate with a master of arts in teaching English to speakers of other languages (TESOL) and bilingual education in 1992. She taught English and Spanish at Ada School for 12 years and then at Van Buren (Ohio) School for 18 years. Since retiring, she has taught part-time at Mount Cory (Ohio) School for four years.

The couple has maintained a lifelong relationship with the institution. Bob has been an adjunct faculty member for several years, teaching a variety of art classes and serving as a student teacher supervisor. His work has appeared in recent campus art shows, including a pottery exhibit in 2005, a faculty exhibit in 2006 and the 125th alumni art show in 2007.

- **Senior forward Josh Bostic of the men’s basketball team was named the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) South Division Player of the Week** on Monday, Jan. 12, for the second time this season and the fourth of his career. Bostic led the Oilers to a pair of wins, with UF scoring 92-77 over Wayne State and 78-71 against Northwood. Morgan Lewis was voted the player of the previous week on Jan. 5. The University of Findlay men’s basketball team has remained in the top spot of the National Association of Basketball Coaches NCAA Division II poll, a place they have held since the initial pre-season rankings.

- **The men’s and women’s indoor track and field teams competed at the Eastern Michigan University Invitational** on Jan. 10 in Ypsilanti, Mich. On the men’s side, John Guagenti finished first in the 400-meter run, and Corey Clarke placed third in the 200-meter dash. For the women, freshman Raven Clay took first in the 60-meter hurdles and second in the 200-meter dash; in the weight throw, Erin Lines placed second and Ashley Jennings was third; Kelly Beamer took bronze in the pole vault and Stephanie Charnigo had a third-place finish in the 400-meter run. Clay was named GLIAC Running Athlete of the Week on Jan. 6. In the 60-meter hurdles, Clay finished with a NCAA automatic qualifying time of 8.51, which was the top mark in all of NCAA Division II.

- **The Roughneck wrestling team continued to be ranked 13th in the nation, according to the National Wrestling Coaches Association poll on Jan. 6.** The Roughnecks lost twice on Jan. 10 at the Cliff Keen Duals in Cedar Falls, Iowa, falling 26-13 to fourth-ranked Minnesota State-Mankato and 30-6 to 12th-ranked Saint Cloud State. Michael Lybarger, Jeff Havelka, Hiram Smith and Andy Zalaskains picked up victories against Mankato and Travis Clark was the lone winner over Saint Cloud State.

- **The women’s basketball team** lost 72-62 to Northwood University Jan. 10 in Midland, Mich., giving the Oilers an 8-5 record on the season, with a 3-5 mark in the GLIAC. Freshman guard Laura Bardall led the Oilers with a career-high 19 points, junior guard Audra Mihalic added 14 points and junior center Jessica Vorst scored eight. As a team, Findlay shot 37 percent from the floor and hit 6-of-20 shots from behind the three-point line.

- **Opportunity is knocking: Your IRA is the key.** If you’re looking for the most tax-effective gift to make to a charitable organization, your individual retirement account (IRA) may very well be the best choice. Included in the \$700 billion economic bailout bill (H.R. 1424, The Financial Rescue Package) signed by President George Bush is a **two-year extension of the IRA rollover provision** that expired at the end of 2007. The provision exempts from taxable income any fund transferred from an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) to a charitable organization provided the donor is age 70 1/2 or older, the rollover is no more than \$100,000 and the contribution is a direct gift to a charity. The provision is retroactive from Jan. 1, 2008, and will apply to gifts made through Dec. 31, 2009.
