



# Project promotes volunteer service on MLK Day

With the help of local community leaders, over 60 students in Grades 8 through university level from Findlay and Hancock County have helped to organize and develop the "Pathway to Peace" initiative—a service learning project and community reflection ceremony revolving around the life and volunteer service ethic of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Community partners providing students and administrative support to the project include: the Black Heritage Library & Cultural Center, the Youth Action Council of the Volunteer Center, United Way of Hancock County, Campfire USA, the Juvenile Diversion Program of the Hancock County Prosecutor's Office, and The University of Findlay Campus Compact Center for Service & Learning.

The "Pathway to Peace" project involves student research and material production on the life and missions of Dr. King, a Scavenger Hunt Service Project, and an "Evening of Reflection" on the project and the civil rights leader's life. The project is sponsored

in part through grants awarded the partnership by the Corporation for National Service in Washington, D.C. and The Findlay - Hancock County Community Foundation.

"The Scavenger Hunt" portion of the project will involve students with adult supervisors visiting approximately 600 homes throughout Findlay on Monday, Jan. 21, 2002 to collect much needed supplies for local social service agencies and to distribute information about Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Supplies to be collected for Hope House for the Homeless, the Loudan Home, Open Arms Domestic Violence Shelter, the Findlay City Mission, Chopin Hall, and the Black Studies Library include items such as: hand soap, shampoo, toilet paper, trash bags, light bulbs, cleaning supplies, office supplies, canned food, and batteries, among others. Any students wishing to participate in the Scavenger Hunt Service Project should contact the Black Heritage Library & Cultural Center at 419-423-4954 or the Campus Compact Center at 419-434-5310 no later than Jan. 18. Students will sort the collected donations at The University of Findlay and present them to representatives from the social service agencies at an evening ceremony which will reflect on the service project and the life of Dr. King.

"An Evening of Reflection" portion of the project will be a ceremony held on Monday, January 21, 2002 from 6 p.m.- 7 p.m. at the College First Church of God, 1100 North Main Street, in Findlay. The guest speaker will be Harrison Phillips, the Loss Prevention Manager at Lowe's Distribution Center in Findlay. The program is free of charge and the public is welcome to attend. Refreshments will be served directly following the program. Several of the community leaders who helped to develop the project also will speak at the ceremony. Stacy Davidson, Executive Director of Minority Student Services at The University of Findlay, will emcee the program and Maile Doyle, Director of the Volunteer Center, United Way of Hancock County, will give the welcome. Wayne Sneath, Director of the Campus Compact Center for Service & Learning at The University of Findlay, will provide a history of the project. Student awards will be presented by Darnell Parker, Director of the Hancock County Prosecutor's Office Juvenile Diversion Program and Nina Parker, Founder and Volunteer Director of the Black Heritage Library & Cultural Center, will provide the closing remarks.

A final component of the "Pathway to Peace" project extends beyond Dr. King's holiday. To celebrate the life and service commitment of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and National Black History Month, the partnership is hosting an Art and Essay Contest for all students in Findlay and Hancock County Schools. A student can be the winner of one of 18 U.S. Savings Bonds to be awarded for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place at the elementary, middle, and high school levels for each contest area. ## ‘Give Blood. Get Cookies.’

It's that time again! The University of Findlay's bloodmobile is rolling into the AMU's multipurpose room on Wednesday, Jan. 23 from 11a.m. to 5p.m. and, in the wake of the Sept. 11th tragedies, is in dire need of refueling.

It's true. The long line of blood donors is no more. The Red Cross is asking that anyone able to donate roll up his sleeve. Sign-up continues Thursday and Friday Jan. 17 and 18 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in Deming Lobby. Refreshments will be on-hand for all donors and coupons for local fast food establishments and prizes will be given away to participants.

In addition, a drawing will be held every hour to win gift certificates to local restaurants ranging from Diamond River, Red Lobster, Chedders, Pilgrims Family Restaurant, Chi-Chi's, Bob Evans, Cracker Barrel and the Spaghetti Shop.

Barbara Sauber, director of blood services with Hancock County's Red Cross, has called specifically for blood types D, B, and A negative, stressing that there is less than one day's supply of these more rare blood types, which are in demand. Additionally, O negative and positive blood types, which are known as universal donors, are being requested.

When an individual requires a blood donation, for a full transfusion or only a pint, the type of blood is very important. Each blood type contains different antibodies in its red blood cells.

Therefore, a person with A negative blood would recognize B positive blood as foreign and the antibodies would attack and reject the new blood. The exception to this reaction is O negative and positive, as long as the negative and positive correspond with the original blood type, because antibodies of other blood types do not react with it.

Blood donors must be at least 17 years of age and 110 pounds for safety purposes. ## Men's track & field performs well at ONU

The University of Findlay men's indoor track and field team captured first-place honors in eight events at the Ohio Northern Friday Night Series on Jan. 11.

Gary Labonte broke the record at Ohio Northern in the 500-meter run with a time of 1:05.93, almost a full second faster than the previous record at Ohio Northern facilities. Matt Hammer also finished under the previous record, but second to Labonte with a time of 1:06.40. Carey Lennox, Ryan Norris and Eric McDade each finished in first in their respective heats in the 55-meter dash.

McDade was the only Oiler to qualify for the finals, finishing fourth in the event with a time of 6.68 seconds. Travis Wright also finished first in the preliminaries of the 55-meter hurdles, but finished second in the finals with a time of 8.03 seconds.

Brad Hammer captured the crown in the 400-meter run with a time of 50.84 seconds. John Wood won the 800-meter event with a time of 1:58.88. He was the only runner in the event to finish under two minutes.

In the 4x400 relay event, the Findlay A and B teams both finished first in their respective section. The A team, featuring Brad Hammer, Kevin Riegler, Aaron Weber and John Wood finished with a time of 3:26.90, while the B team (Matt Hammer, Gary Labonte, Ed Vilt and Josh Keuneke) finished with a time of 3:30.12.

The last two Oilers to capture first place honors came in the jumps, with Mark Meibers and Derek Riker achieving the honors. Meibers tied for first in the high jump with a jump of 6'02.25, while Riker was the sole person in first in the pole vault with a height of 14'05.25.

The men travel once again to ONU on Saturday, Jan. 18.

## Men's volleyball loses season opener

The University of Findlay men's volleyball team lost its season opener on Sunday afternoon at Croy Gymnasium, losing in five games to St. Francis (Pa.) 30-28, 29-31, 27-30, 30-24 and 9-15. The Oilers start the season with a 0-1 record while the Red Flash evened their record at 1-1.

Steve Yarnell and Jeff Overfield had 14 kills apiece to pace the Oilers. Overfield with six digs and four blocks, while Yarnell added five blocks for the Oilers. Nick Wolf had 45 assists and a team-high 10 digs in the loss.

# Streak snapped: UF suffers first loss of season

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich. — The tables were turned. The team that usually administers the beatings became the victim as the University of Findlay was defeated by Lake Superior State University, 92-79, in a conference matchup last Saturday.

The defeat, a game in which LSSU narrowly led by a score of 38-36 at halftime, ended a season-long 14-game winning streak. Also, it was the first time the Oilers (14-1 overall, 5-1 Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference) failed to score at least 80 points in a game this season. Scoring wasn't the Oilers' problem, however.

There are some important factors that have led to Findlay's successful season and two of those factors were nonexistent in

## Green, Baldrige Qualify for Nationals

Junior Tanea Green and senior Beth Baldrige became national qualifiers with their performances at the Ohio Northern University Friday Night Series on Jan. 11.

Green qualified in the 55-meter dash with a time of 7.17 seconds in the preliminaries, three one-hundredths of a second under the automatic qualifying standard in that event. Green later finished first in the finals with a time of 7.29 seconds. Wilmington's Dana Crow finished second with a time of 7.56.

Baldrige qualified for nationals in the high jump event, winning the event with a jump of 5'05.75. She qualified provisionally, well over the provisional standard of 5'04.50. Both Green and Baldrige will compete at the NCAA Division II Championships later this year.

Overall, the women's track team competed well at Ohio Northern with nine Oilers capturing first place in their respective events. Green won in both the 55-meter dash as well as the 300-meter run with a time of 42.14 seconds.

Nicole Matthews was also a two-time winner on Friday, winning both the 1500-meter run as well as the 800-meter run. Typhaknee Greene captured first-place honors in the 400-meter run, while Baldrige captured first-place in the high jump.

Other first place finishers included Andrea Morgan with a time of 3:13.58 in the 1000-meter run, Megan Wygle in her section of the 300-meter run with a time of 45.34 seconds and the Oiler's 4x400-meter relay team of Andrea Morgan, Nicole Matthews, Kelly Cothorn and Typhaknee Greene with a time of 4:09.14.

## Women's bball falls to LSSU

The University of Findlay women's basketball team lost for the second straight time on Saturday afternoon, 72-60 at the hands of Lake Superior State. The Oilers dropped to 11-4 overall and 4-2 in the GLIAC South division. The Lakers improved to 10-2 overall and 5-2 in the GLIAC North.

Molly Holt led the Oilers with 18 points, while Chantele Frost chipped in with 11, marking the only two Oilers scoring in double digits. Tiffany Stewart and Kerri Unverferth were next in line with six points apiece. The Oilers shot a season low 29.8% from the floor in the game.

The Oilers fell behind 37-26 at the end of the first half, a half that saw the Oilers shoot just six of 25 from the field (24.0%). Findlay could not dig themselves out of the hole in the second half as the Lakers posted the 12-point win.

the loss LSSU (8-6, 1-6). Rebounding has been one of the team's strong points this year, but the Lakers grabbed 49 compared to UF's 20. Findlay also made only four assists, which is way below the season average of 17. The team did manage to stay consistent in the area of ballhandling, committing only 13 turnovers. In spite of the less-than-perfect play, five Oilers did score in double digits.

Bob Mitchell's 18 points led the team. Mitchell also went a solid 13-for-15 from the foul line. Charles Warren finished with 16 points while both Kyle Hunt and Marwan Gaines scored 13 points each. Jeff Reese also contributed by scoring 10 points. Unfortunately one of the Lakers' players had a career performance.

Ben Dewar scored 36 points (11-for-15 shooting, 10-for-12 foul shooting) and also hit four of six three-point shots. Quentin Hunt and Brandon Woodworth also contributed by scoring 13 and 12

points, respectively. Bobby Miehke also scored 11 points. Findlay returns home on Saturday, Jan. 19, to take on Ashland University at 1 p.m.

## Oilers, Beavers tie at 2-2

The night after Bemidji State recaptured fourth place with a 5-3 win over The University of Findlay, the standings remained the same on Saturday night as the Oilers and Beavers played to a 2-2 tie in Bemidji, Minnesota in the final game of the series. The Oilers dropped to 8-11-1 on the season and 4-5-1 in the College Hockey America.

Bemidji regained a one-point lead over Findlay in the standings after capturing three out of a possible four points over the weekend. The Beavers captured an early lead on Friday, Jan. 11, only to see the Oilers come-from-behind and nearly tie the hockey game.

Bemidji's Marty Goulet scored an empty-net goal to seal the 5-3 win for the Beavers on Friday. However, Saturday's game was completely the opposite as the Oilers claimed the early lead only to see Bemidji come-from-behind to escape with a tie.

Russ Kelley got things going for Findlay just 27 seconds into the game, when he beat Bemidji State goaltender Grady Hunt for an early 1-0 lead. Kelley's fourth goal of the season was unassisted.

The game became 2-0 at the 15:04 mark of the first, when Aaron Weegar scored his fourth goal of the season for the Oilers. Christian Olson and Nick Udovicic picked up the assists. However, the Beavers would not go away.

Anders Olsson scored at the 17:24 mark of the second period to cut the Oiler lead in half. Goulet and Jeff McGill earned the assists. It would remain 2-1 until the 12:42 mark of the third period when Mark Phenow scored the game-tying goal for Bemidji. Says Phrakonkham and Brendan Cook picked up the assists on the goal.

Findlay's Kevin Fines would take over from there. Fines stopped the remaining Bemidji shots in the third then stopped all four Beaver shots in overtime to seal the tie for the Oilers.

In all, Fines made 39 saves including 17 in the final period and overtime to allow the Oilers to escape with a point. Fines improved to 2-4-1 and made his second great start in a row. Hunt stopped 34 of 36 shots for the game, but faced just seven shots in the final period and overtime combined.

The Oilers will travel to Schenectady, New York next Friday and Saturday, January 18 and 19 to take on Union College in a pair of non-conference games. Face-offs both nights are scheduled for 7 p.m.

The Oilers, shut out for the second time in the last four games, dropped to 7-13-1 after the loss. In fact, the Oilers have been outscored 15-3 during the losing streak.

Wisconsin scored two goals in the second period and added two goals in the third period for the decisive victory. Steph Millar scored the eventual game-winner at the 13:40 mark of the second period to give Wisconsin a 1-0 lead. Carla Macleod picked up the lone assist.

Just over two minutes later, Karen Rickard put the Badgers up by two goals with her seventh goal of the season. The Badgers, however, were not done, scoring again at the 8:30 mark of the third period.

Kendra Antony scored her 11th goal of the season, and fourth on the weekend, to put Wisconsin ahead, 3-0. Leah Federman scored her first goal of the season to round out the scoring at the 15:05 mark.

Freshman Amy Jones suffered the loss, but played well, stopping 34 of 38 Wisconsin shots. Jones dropped to 4-2 on the season. The Oilers managed just 14 shots for the game, and Jackie MacMillan stopped all 14, improving her record to 11-7-1.
