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UF-TV collaborates with young producers

The newest producers at UF-TV are also the youngest in the station's history.

Four junior high school students have been working with Steven Beck and UF-TV as a part of the smART works after school program. For the past month, they have been learning how to run the equipment associated with television production and have begun the steps to produce their own television show.

The smART works program is a collaboration of the Arts Partnership, the Diversion Program, and the Findlay After and Before School Sessions (F.A.B.S.S.). The program is meant to teach "at risk" children how to make positive lifestyle choices through arts-based interventions.

In addition to the media arts, there are children enrolled in theater, art and music programs. Jan. 7 through March 25 is the first of four sessions that junior high children can be eligible to participate in. The program is open to sixth, seventh, and eighth graders who have had one run-in with the law, and is designed to give them a positive outlet for their energies.

The children that work with Beck are transported to the Egner Fine Arts building every Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon. This is the only workshop in the program that does not meet at Central Middle School.

Beck, the head of the Communication area, has never taught children at this level before, and says that the smART Works program has made him, "appreciate college students better."

Lisa Glaze of the F.A.B.S.S. program contacted Beck after he had previously worked with her concerning introducing media literacy into the school district. In the past, Beck has brought children in to work on projects in the television studio, but never this extensively.

The media arts workshop is the only workshop to experience 100 percent participation. Since there are only four children in the workshop, it allows Mr. Beck to work more closely with the children and help them build real skills in the field of communication. The final projects will be aired on UF-TV.

Barry Scott to relive 'Dream'

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s powerful message has been heard many times to keep the message of Civil Rights alive. In honor of February's Black History Month, Barry Scott, an accomplished performer, will offer a dramatic interpretation of King's "I Have a Dream" speech tonight, Feb. 7, in the Multipurpose room of the AMU from 7-9 p.m.

The performance is co-sponsored by the Black Student Union and Campus Program Board.

A Nashville native, Scott graduated from Tennessee State University with a degree in Theatre and Speech Communications. He is the founder and artistic director of The American Negro Playwright Theatre in Nashville.

Scott began reciting King's speeches for churches and schools in Nashville's black community. When Scott was 16 years old, a racial incident with a Nashville police officer proved to be a pivotal point in his life. After that violent incident, Scott and his father watched the film of King's "I have a dream" speech over and over, and King's message hit Scott with its

true intensity.

"I realized that I didn't have cause to be ashamed," Scott said in a press release. "I realized that speech was a parable for action, a blueprint for freedom."

Scott has created his tribute to Dr. King, a man who literally changed our nation, to teach a generation of students about one of America's most violent, yet inspiring times.

In addition to Scott's reenactment presentation, Scott also has performed in television and film roles. He had minor roles in television shows including "I'll Fly Away" and "Rescue 911," and he played a minister in the series "In the Heat of the Night." Scott co-starred with Jim Varney in the Touchstone picture "Ernest Goes to Jail."

Scott also may be recognized as a disabled veteran in Travis Tritt's music video, "Anymore." He was a script consultant in "Slam Dunk Ernest" and he was featured in the role of Captain Jackson in "The Expert," starring Jeff Speakman. Scott has also performed for the Tennessee Repertory Theatre, conducted acting workshops and won several awards including the Ralph Edmondson National Award for a play in which he wrote, directed and starred.

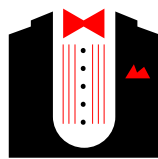

The pre-law advisors, Dr. Mark Polelle (x5954) and Dr. Paul Chwialkowski (x6992) have begun the groundwork for the new organization, Law Society, to be structured at the University of Findlay. With the enthusiasm seen in the newly developed program, Law and the Liberal Arts, a forum to continue learning about the law was held on Feb. 4.

The society will focus on any aspect of a law school career deemed of interest to the members. Tentative plans discussed at the initial meeting included having a recent U of F graduate relate their experiences while currently attending law school, a visit to a law

school, group work with practice exams for the Law School Admission Test (LSAT), and also various other speakers, such as law school recruiters.

The activation of West Law to the library system was seen as a great boost to the Law and the Liberal Arts program. This system enables legal research to be done on-line thereby opening many possibilities for the law classes offered.

Law bulletins have been organized in the basement of Howard 112. If there is a specific college or university that a student is interested in, that student may come and browse through the brochures and booklets.

Chwialkowski asked for feedback on the current major.

While not all graduates may decide to go to law school another option was presented in the form of subspecialties within the field. Individualized majors could be developed for those with an interest in the CIA or FBI, or be comprised of more environmental classes to enable you to get exactly the degree you wish. Anyone with an interest in the law is invited to attend the meetings, regardless of major. If you didn't see the brochures and missed the first meeting, don't despair. There is still the opportunity to become involved.

The Black Lantern Processional dates back to the 1800s

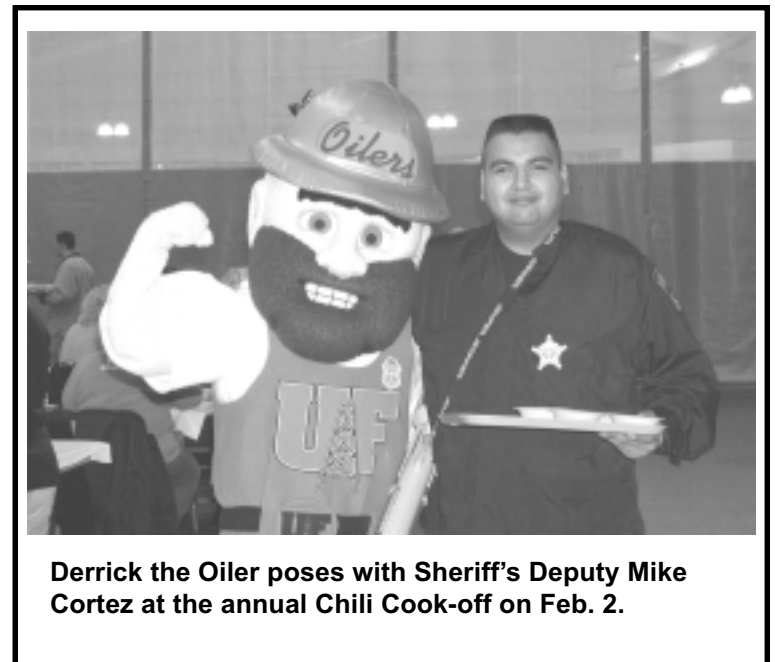
when it was used at Yale University to announce the new members who were accepted into Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity.

Wayne State ices Oilers

The University of Findlay men's hockey team was defeated both Feb. 1 and Feb. 2 by Wayne State, 4-2 and 4-3, respectively. The loss dropped the Oilers to 10-14-2 overall and 4-7-1 in the CHA.

Friday night in Detroit, the Oilers offense was led by freshman forward Rigel Shaw, scoring Findlay's two goals for the evening. Andy Croak handed out two assists with Steve Traver dishing out one.

Jamie VandeSpyker played well in defeat for the Oilers, stopping 40 of 44 Wayne State shots on goal. He dropped to 7-8-1 on the season. David Guerrero made 28 saves for WSU, picking up his 10th win

of the season.

In front of 1,050 fans at the Clauss Ice Arena Saturday night, Findlay scored three goals to WSU's four. Scoring for the Oilers were Lee Arnold, assisted by Darryl Somerville and Brian Sherry; Nick Udovicic, assisted by Sherry and D. Somerville; and Jason Maxwell, assisted by Brant Somerville.

The Oilers gave up 45 shots to Wayne State, but Kevin Fines was excellent in defeat, stopping 41 of 45 shots in the loss. His record dropped to 3-6-1 overall. Guerrero improved to 11-11-3 after his 28-save performance.

Findlay will travel to Alabama-Huntsville for a pair of games Feb. 8 and 9.

Track teams fair well at GLIAC/GLVC

The University of Findlay men and women's indoor track teams hosted the GLIAC/GLVC Challenge at the Koehler Center on Friday, Feb. 1. The GLIAC got the better of the GLVC in both the men and women's events, with many athletes becoming NCAA Division II qualifiers.

The men's team did not have anybody qualify for nationals, but did take home one first-place finish. The Oilers' 4 x 400 m. relay team captured first place with a time of 3:20.93. The team consisted of Brad Hammer, Gary Labonte, Aaron Weber and John Wood. The 4 x 400 "B" team for the Oilers took third place in the event.

Four athletes provisionally qualifying for Nationals highlighted the women's team re-

sults. Tanea Green recorded a personal best in the 60 m. dash with a time of 7.56 seconds. It qualified her provisionally, but it was not enough to win the day's race, as Grand Valley State's Isis Charles registered a time of 7.50. Green would later win the 200 m. dash in easy fashion with a time of 24.66 seconds.

Andrea Morgan and Kelly Cothorn both bested the provisional standard in the 800 m. run. Morgan captured the event and set a new Koehler Center record with a time of 2:13.50. Cothorn finished in third with a time of 2:14.02.

Beth Baldrige again swept the high jump with a leap of 5'07.25". It qualified her provisionally in the event, and the jump was two inches better than Ashland's Kristin Kahn, who finished second.

Women's bball suffers double loss

ERIE, Pa.— The University of Findlay women's basketball team was dealt a double blow last week, losing 62-35 to Mercyhurst on Thursday and 79-64 to Gannon on Saturday.

The loss to Mercyhurst (6-15 overall, 2-10 Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference) was somewhat of a moral defeat as the Lakers are in last place in the GLIAC South Division. The Knights (18-3, 9-3), on the other hand were ranked No. 5 on the ESPN/USA Today NCAA II Coaches' Weekly Top 25 when they hosted the Oilers. UF did manage to play almost shot-for-shot with Gannon in the second half as both teams scored 41 points.

What hurt Findlay (13-8, 6-6) was the fact that GU had two lethal weapons on offense. Kristin Roseberry and Candy Myers scored 23 and 22 points, respectively. Roseberry (7-of-13 shooting, 9-of-13 foul shooting) also pulled down a team-high eight boards and Myers (7-of-12, 2-of-3) made six three point shots. No other Knight scored in double-digits but they all shot well, hitting 46.7 percent (28-of-60) of all floor shots. Gannon also demonstrated that they are the complete package by racking up 21 assists, 35 rebounds, and an excellent +8 turnover ratio.

Chantele Frost's 20 points and six rebounds were not enough to give the Oilers a much-needed victory. The team has now lost six of its last eight contests and is falling in the division standings. Two areas that suffered during the contest with Gannon was the high number of turnovers committed (22) and the sub-par shooting (38.5 percent).

The women hope to right the ship against the Ashland University Eagles (14-7, 8-4) in Ashland, Ohio. The contest is scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 9, at 1 p.m.

Findlay hits bumps in the road

ERIE, Pa.—Tough times continued for the University of Findlay men's basketball team as it suffered back-to-back conference losses to Mercyhurst and Gannon this past week.

The Oilers (16-5 overall, 7-5 Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference), who have dropped five of their last seven contests, lost to Mercyhurst, 76-74, in overtime on Jan.31. Findlay then fell, 87-77, to the mighty Gannon Golden Knights on Feb.2. Poor luck, rather than poor play, was the main culprit in the twin-killing.

Trailing 42-29 to Gannon (19-2, 10-2) at the half, it seemed as if Findlay had no chance of winning. The Oilers made a valiant comeback, however, when a Marwan Gaines shot with three minutes to go cut the Knights' lead to eight. Then, back to back three-pointers by Tyson McGlaughlin and Tony Hiser put the score at 83-77, GU, with just 39 seconds remaining.

Unfortunately, the Knights hit their last-second free throws to avert the UF comeback attempt and earn the victory. Gannon's solid foul shooting (90 percent, 18-of-20) was just one example of its dominance throughout much of the game.

The Knights, who entered the contest ranked 9th on the National Association of Basketball Coaches' NCAA II Poll, were led offensively by freshman Geoff Husted. He scored 20 points (8-of-10 shooting, 3-of-10 foul shooting) and grabbed seven rebounds. As a team, GU shot a red-hot 47.6 percent (30-of-63) and

grabbed 38 boards. As evidenced in the second half, Findlay put up some positive numbers, as well.

Kyle Hunt was too much for the Knights to handle as he scored 32 points (12-of-25, 5-of-8) with six rebounds. Charles Warren also chimed in with 10 points, shooting 3-of-7 and hitting both shots from the charity stripe. The team also grabbed 41 boards with Jeff Reese's 10 leading the unit. The overall shooting could have been better, however, as the team hit 39.4 percent (26-of-66) and just 65.4 percent (17-of-26) of its free throws.

Findlay actually played the better game of this road trip in the 76-74 OT loss to the Mercyhurst Lakers (12-9, 5-7). The Oilers dominated in the second half, making 51.5 percent (17-of-33) of their shots and outscoring MC, 43-32. The Lakers eventually caught fire at the end, forcing overtime. Justin Shouse was the hero of the game for the Lakers as he scored four points in the extra period. Shouse's 24 total points led the team in scoring. Overall, Findlay's performance was similar to that of the Gannon game.

Only three Oilers scored in double digits: Bob Mitchell (6-of-12, 4-of-6) with 18 points, Kyle Hunt's (7-of-16, one free throw), and Marwan Gaines' (5-of-13) 10 points. Both Hunt and Gaines made seven rebounds apiece. The team did play with good ball control, grabbing 41 boards and committing just 14 turnovers.

The Oilers continue their road trip when they visit archrival Ashland University (15-6, 8-4) this Saturday, Feb. 9, in Ashland, Ohio. The matchup begins at 3 p.m.

Women swimmers claim first win of season

The University of Findlay women's swimming team earned an impressive 101-89 victory over Salem-Teikyo for its first win of the season on Saturday, Feb. 2.

Janet Caraveo and Cindy Broxterman were two-time winners, while Bethie Paul captured a single first-place finish. Caraveo won the 200-freestyle with a time of 2:09.05, just over three seconds ahead of teammate Jen Steffee, who finished second. Caraveo also captured the 200-butterfly with a time of 2:25.43, 16 seconds ahead of Salem-Teikyo's second-place finisher.

Broxterman took first place in the 1650 freestyle with a time of 18:51.07, nearly a minute faster than Salem-Teikyo's best finisher. Broxterman also captured the 500-freestyle with a time of 5:32.50. Paul earned her win in the 200-breaststroke with a time of 2:48.61.

The Oilers garnered wins, as a team, in the 200-freestyle (Caraveo, 1st; Steffee, 2nd; Alisha Pessefall, 4th), the 500-freestyle (Broxterman, 1st; Caraveo, 2nd; Steffee, 4th) and in the 200-breaststroke (Paul, 1st; Abbey Algiere, 2nd; Jessie Huser, 3rd).

The men's swimming team lost to Salem-Teikyo by the score of 67-36. The Oilers remain winless on the season.

Josh Fate and Willie Polk

each took a first-place finish in the meet. Fate won the 500-freestyle with a time of 5:09.19, while Polk captured the 200-backstroke. The two also had a second-place finish apiece, with Polk taking second in the 50-freestyle with a time of 23.15 seconds. Fate took second in the 400 individual medley with a time of 4:35.95.

The Aqua Oilers will be at Tri-State University on Saturday, Feb. 9.

Volleyball falls to BSU

The University of Findlay men's volleyball team lost its third consecutive conference match on Friday night, as it was defeated by Ball State in three straight, 22-30, 22-30 and 13-30. The Oilers dropped to 4-4 overall and 0-3 in the MIVA.

Josh Noblet led the Oilers with 10 kills in a losing effort. Jeff Overfield chipped in with eight kills and Scott Monroe had six

kills and a game-high seven digs.

Josh Zuidema and Matthew Denmark led Ball State with nine kills apiece while Doug Market and Paul Fasshauer tallied six kills apiece. Keith Schunzel had 43 assists for the Cardinals.

The Oilers will travel to Columbus, on Friday, Feb. 8, to take on the Ohio State Buckeyes at 7 p.m.
