The University of Findlay offers a 3+3 Wellness and Health Promotion to the Doctor of Occupational Therapy (OTD) Program path. After 3 years of undergraduate coursework, students will enter the OTD Program. Students complete the first year of the OTD curriculum and earn a bachelor's degree in Wellness and Health Promotion. Students will continue coursework to earn a doctoral degree in occupational therapy.

A major in wellness and health promotion consists of an interdisciplinary program of study in which students will implement health assessments and wellness programs. The degree promotes scholarly inquiry and cultivates professionals capable of assisting others in developing self-responsibility for their own health and wellness through healthy, active lifestyles.

At the University of Findlay, the OTD Program prepares students to not only practice occupational therapy, but also fulfill leadership roles and advanced positions in the field. In four years, students studying exercise science will earn a bachelor's degree in Exercise Science for Health Professions and may go on to pursue a doctoral degree in occupational therapy which is a three-year program. A doctoral degree in occupational therapy prepares students to not only practice occupational therapy, but also fulfill leadership roles and advanced positions in the field.

Students will receive a supplemental early assurance application if granted undergraduate admission and they also have a minimum overall GPA of 3.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale

In order to maintain early assurance candidacy status, students will be required to:

- Meet with an identified OT advisor once per semester to ensure that the student maintains the requirements of the Early Assurance Program.
- Have all OTD Program prerequisites completed by the end of their senior year.
- Complete and submit the intent to enroll application and the OT advisor verification of status during the application cycle prior to their intended start date.

Occupational therapists can help children develop motor skills and hand-eye coordination, learn basic tasks, maintain positive behaviors, and improve focus and social skills. Working with children who have physical, sensory, or cognitive disabilities is a highly rewarding field that requires a unique skillset. To more easily acquire this set of skills, the University of Findlay offers a clear path from the College of Education's Intervention Specialist Mild to Moderate Program to the College of Health Profession's Doctor of Occupational Therapy (OTD) Program.

In four years, students earn a bachelor's degree in intervention specialist education and then go on to pursue the three-year doctoral degree in occupational therapy. The pathway curriculum includes the OTD prerequisites as well as education courses that cover teaching methodologies and instructional practices for students with special needs. Students learn how to creatively work with children of all ages through intervention specialist field experiences and earn licensure as a K-12 intervention specialist.

Evidence of Excellence

Psychology to Doctor of Occupational Therapy 3+3 Pathway

The University of Findlay offers a 3+3 Psychology to the Doctor of Occupational Therapy (OTD) Program path. After 3 years of undergraduate coursework, students will enter the OTD Program. Students complete the first year of the OTD curriculum and earn a bachelor's degree in Psychology. Students will continue coursework to earn a doctoral degree in occupational therapy.

A major in psychology emphasizes thinking, communicating and positively interacting with others. The major blends strong science and applied courses that prepare students for graduate study. Opportunities exist for joint research studies with faculty members and students complete several credit hours of service-learning experiences by volunteering in the community at mental heal centers, psychiatric facilities, shelters, schools, businesses, nursing homes, day care centers and other organizations.

At the University of Findlay, the OTD Program prepares students to not only practice occupational therapy, but also fulfill leadership roles and advanced positions in the field. Occupational therapists assist individuals across the lifespan to develop, improve, sustain or restore daily living, work or productivity and play or leisure by using meaningful and healthy occupations.

The OTD program embodies principles of human occupation and incorporates community-based experiences and service learning to prepare occupational

therapists who understand and value a communityfocused and occupation-based approach to practice, and participate in ongoing professional development in preparation for service in diverse communities.

OTD Program Highlights

Three-Year Program - The OTD Program is a three-year program designed to be completed in nine consecutive semesters, including summers, with fieldwork integrated throughout the academic program. The third year of the curriculum consists of Level II Fieldwork and Doctoral Capstone Experience and Project.

OT Adaptive Living House - Students gain the knowledge and skills that are required to adapt home environments and devices that support individuals' day-to-day activities. Early Assurance - High school seniors have the option to apply for Early Assurance, which holds a seat for them in the OTD Program while they complete their bachelor's degree at Findlay.

Consider Becoming an Occupational Therapist

Young or old, we all have a job to do—the job of living. Learning, growing, playing, working, managing our homes, and caring for our families are among the "occupations" of life.

Unfortunately, physical, emotional, or other challenges often prevent people from fully participating in the job of living. Disease, injury, depression, or developmental problems can make it difficult for people to do everyday tasks or be active and independent.

Occupational therapy—a vibrant, growing profession—makes it possible for people to achieve independence and to enjoy life to its fullest. By choosing a career in occupational therapy, you will make a difference! You will be able to improve the lives of people, from newborns to the very old.

Students today can look forward to dynamic careers working in multiple settings with people of all ages. And the employment outlook for occupational therapists is bright! Recent information published by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics (http://stats.bls.gov/oco/ocos078.htm) has projected that the job outlook for occupational therapists will improve substantially in the next several years and will continue to do so for the foreseeable future. Specifically, it states that "employment of occupational therapists is expected to increase much faster than the average for all occupations through 2014," meaning that employment is expected to increase by 27% or more.

One of the greatest advantages of a career in occupational therapy is the wide variety of opportunities available to occupational therapy graduates. Many practitioners choose to help children thrive in the "occupations" of childhood, which include learning, playing, and growing. Therapists work in schools with students who have learning disabilities or behavioral problems. Others work with premature newborns at pediatric hospitals or children with cerebral palsy, Down syndrome, and other disabilities.

Occupational therapists also work with individuals in their homes, community centers, rehabilitation hospitals, businesses, and nursing homes. In these settings, occupational therapists help people with traumatic injuries, stroke, Alzheimer's disease, or mental health problems, learn to live productive lives through the use of meaningful occupations.

Those who join the field today may choose other areas of practice that are increasingly important. These new specialties include training workers to use proper ergonomics on the job, helping people with low vision maintain their independence, making buildings and homes more accessible, older driver evaluation and training, and promoting health and wellness.

Occupational therapy is a career for individuals who care about people and have a desire to learn, achieve, and contribute their best to society and the profession!


Salary by Region


Salaries vary by region of the country. This may be a factor of cost of living as well as supply and demand.

The median salary for full-time OTs continues to trend higher. However, for OTAs the median salary has decreased. The OT median salary in 2023 is \$75,500 and for OTAs is \$46,000.

Trends in Salary by Practice Area

Academia continues to have the highest median salary for OTs and OTAs. For OTs, mental health and other innovative or emerging settings settings saw the largest increase from 2018. The largest increase for OTAs was in academia with decreases in other innovative or emerging settings, hospitals, and early intervention / school.
