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1. What's Happening on Campus?

Informed. Inspired. Awed. Amused. The nearly 260 attendees of the 20th annual Mazza Summer Conference, held July 15-19, were all that and more.

Eleven outstanding authors and illustrators of children's books gave presentations on their work. In addition, they participated in pull-out sessions in which they interacted with the teachers, librarians, college students, Mazza Museum volunteers and others who came to learn more about children's literature. Many attendees also earned undergraduate or graduate credit through the conference.

Highlighting the conference was Jon Klassen. He received the Caldecott Award for "This Is Not My Hat," which he wrote and illustrated, and a Caldecott Honor for "Extra Yarn," by Mac Barnett. He was awarded both in 2013, which was the first time since 1947 that an author/illustrator has

won both awards in the same year. Klassen began his career in animation and was employed by DreamWorks Animation, where he helped illustrate "Kung Fu Panda." But he found his niche in children's book illustration where his visual humor is appreciated by young and old. "I Want My Hat Back," was his first book, which Klassen said he wrote in just 15 minutes. It was published in 2011.

For "The House Baba Built," Ed Young mined his memory for details of his childhood home in Shanghai, China, which was built by his architect father. Young shared the story of his quest to write this memoir. With more than 80 books to his credit, Young won the Caldecott Medal for "Lon Po Po: A Red-Riding Hood Story from China" in 1990, and he received the Mazza Medallion for artistic diversity in 2002. Other featured authors and illustrators included

Michael Hall, Walter Wick, James Dean, Julie Paschkis, Sheila McGraw, Tom Lichtenheld, Sherri Duskey Rinker, Roger Roth and Christopher Raschka.

A "Women in Philanthropy" conference is planned for Saturday, Oct. 12, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., at Winebrenner Theological Seminary on the Findlay campus. It is an initiative of three university



presidents, Dr. Kathy Krendl, Otterbein; Dr. Mary Ellen Mazey, Bowling Green State University; and Dr. Katherine Fell. The University of Findlay is the first to host the conference, which is designed to raise awareness of the role women play in philanthropy. 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4. Alumni Spotlight

Through Their Viewfinder: Alums Aaron Osborne '00 and Ben Walton '04 Produce UF Videos for You to See

If you want a glimpse of The University of Findlay's campus, programs, students, events and television commercials, all you need to do is to go to the UF website at www.findlay.edu and click on the YouTube button at the bottom of the page.

You will see video clips on a vast variety of topics. What you won't see are the two men behind the camera who do the filming, editing and graphics

to create the videos. Aaron Osborne '00 and Ben Walton '04 compose the media technology department and are the creative force directing the University's videos and television ads. They are assisted by the Office of Marketing and Communication, whose staff members often write scripts and provide photography and graphics for the videos.

During the past year, the University launched an advertising campaign to inform prospective students and their parents that tuition is not as expensive at The University of Findlay as they might think, but actually is mid-range, costing slightly more, on average, than a large state school.

In a group brainstorming session on how to create a television commercial conveying this message, Osborne came up with the creative concept of a spokesperson located in a room that is completely gray, except for a few orange accents. "I instantly saw what that would look like. I knew exactly what to do with it," Osborne said. The staff painted the set in the production studio entirely gray for the filming. The resulting commercial is unique and attention grabbing. It helped drive traffic to the financial aid calculator on the UF website, where usage increased by 300 percent. Osborne and Walton also did a video clip that received 31,000 hits on the UF website and attracted national attention. The UF football team was the first in the nation to put their last names on the backs of their helmets. The Athletics Department requested a reveal video, which aired in April 2013. Walton balanced a sample helmet on an acrylic tube on top of a small stool that was rigged to a drill to make it slowly rotate. While Walton did the filming, Osborne did the editing special effects. Simple, but arresting, the video close-up of the revolving helmet caught the attention of commentators who discussed it on ESPN. Click here to see this 52-second clip.

In 2006, when a new camera and commercial editing software from Avid were purchased for the department, Osborne shot a short video for practice and to learn how everything worked. Walton was literally the walk-on talent. He walked down a hallway as part of the video. Osborne submitted the video to a contest sponsored by Avid and judged by video editors from big production houses in New York City. "I shot a couple things and just happened to win," Osborne commented modestly. Osborne won a trip for two to the Sundance Film Festival in Utah. Of course, he took Walton with him.

As students at The University of Findlay, both experienced the personal attention that helped guide them to their current careers. A native of Findlay, Osborne said he had applied to UF and other schools, but didn't intend to go to college immediately after graduation from Van Buren School. But a UF admissions counselor called a week before classes started to see if he was coming and helped Osborne enroll at the last minute.

Osborne cited the influence of the late Steve Beck, who was director of the academic communication program at the time. Beck encouraged Osborne with positive feedback, saying he had natural talent. Beck also got Osborne jobs with community organizations doing videos that gave him additional practice.

After graduating in December of 2000, Osborne was hired in 2001 as coordinator and instructor of multimedia production. At the time, UF offered a major in broadcast telecommunication and was producing seven half-hour television shows for UF-TV with approximately 30 students, Osborne recalled.

Walton had a similar experience. After graduating from Mohawk High School, he worked as an airplane propeller mechanic in Tiffin for a year before suddenly deciding the first week of August to go to college. Findlay was able to enroll him within a week and a half as an undeclared major. He investigated various majors on campus as a result of an assignment in his Freshman Seminar class with Jan Taylor, undeclared major adviser, before settling on broadcast telecommunications.

Again, Beck spotted talent, and by his sophomore year, Walton was serving in a student leadership position, producing the TV shows as student assistant director.

Walton did a post-graduation internship at the Ohio Statehouse, filming sessions of the House, Senate and Supreme Court for a year before landing a job with the Columbus City Schools doing public relations and training videos. He worked at the school district for three years before returning to The University of Findlay in 2008 as a media technology specialist.

Although the television station is now off the air and the broadcast major has been eliminated, the two still have plenty to do. Their on-campus clients request services ranging from filming presentations by guest speakers and producing promotional videos for various majors to shooting testimonials for the annual induction of Distinguished Alumni.

In addition to their work at UF, Osborne and Walton also share an interest in brewing craft beers. After home brewing beer for a number of years with four other partners, the hobby has turned commercial with

the formation of Findlay Brewing Co., which qualifies as a nanobrewery. They produce about 50 gallons a week, equating to approximately a barrel and half.

After receiving the appropriate licensing recently, they now supply a restaurant, a grocery store and a wineseller in Findlay and a taproom in Columbus. On July 26, they held a grand opening of their taproom at 227 ½ North Main St., open Friday evenings, where they sell their American Bitter and Floodwater Stout, along with several other beers.


In addition to their full-time jobs and their hobby-turned-commercial enterprise, Osborne and Walton are each working on a master of arts degree in education with an emphasis in technology at UF. The two are hoping for the resurrection of the broadcast major and preparing for it ahead of time. The credential would allow them to teach as adjunct faculty, if the need arose. "Currently, we are the only people on campus who have the expertise to operate the television studio," Osborne said.

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5. Oiler Sports

Derrick Vicars

Former standout track and field athlete, Derrick Vicars, finished ninth in the shot put at the World University Games in Kazan, Russia. Vicars, a two-time national champion during his tenure with the Oilers, recorded the highest finish in the event for Team USA as he recorded a toss of 18.28 meters. He also took 13th in the discus at 55 meters and is the first Oilers track athlete to compete in the prestigious event.

Track and Field

Both the Oilers men's and women's track and field teams earned NCAA Division II All-Academic honors as the United States Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA) released their annual academic awards on July 24. The men's team had the fifth highest grade point average among NCAA Division II teams for the 2012-13 season, while the women were ranked 18th in the nation. The men finished the year with a GPA of 3.29 while the women sported a 3.42 GPA.

Women's Golf

The University of Findlay women's golf program earned academic honors from the Women's Golf Coaches Association (WGCA) on July 17 for recording the second highest grade point average among all NCAA programs last season. The Oilers finished the 2012-13 campaign with a team GPA of 3.837. They finished as the runner-up among all women's golf programs to Lee University, who obtained a 3.955 GPA. The programs ranked include NCAA Division I, II and III women's golf teams.

Dominic Guarnieri New Head Golf Coach

Dominic Guarnieri ('05) was chosen to lead both the men's and women's golf programs for the Oilers as he will take over for the recently retired Al Baker ('73). Guarnieri served on staff as an assistant last season under Baker and was also a graduate assistant coach for the Oilers for two years after winning four letters on the men's golf team from 2002-05. Between his stints at Findlay, Guarnieri was an assistant golf coach at St. Marys Memorial High School for one year before taking over the head coaching position for two years. In his second year at the helm of the St. Marys program, he led the team to their only conference tournament win in school history. Guarnieri also has had a successful playing career

outside of coaching as he was the 2010 and 2012 Mercer County Elks Club champion. He was also the 2011 Findlay Country Club champion and was named the 2011 TDGA Player of the Year.

GLIAC Presidents' Trophy

The University of Findlay finished third in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) Presidents' Trophy Standings for the 2012-13 campaign behind Grand Valley State University and Ashland University. The Oilers racked up 158 total points in the standings. Grand Valley State registered 245 points, and Ashland accumulated 201 total points. The women's programs at Findlay registered 86 total points while the men's teams scored 72. The Oilers also claimed one conference championship, winning the 2013 GLIAC tournament in men's basketball.
