General Information

The Health Equity Case Competition will be held the week of the Health Equity - I Can Make a Difference Conference. Teams will complete a case to simulate real-world roles and responsibilities that they will have as health care providers. The purpose of this competition is to increase understanding of challenges patients face within healthcare and to practice the skills needed to serve diverse populations.

The competition will be performed in pairs. Teams can utilize resources for the competition. There is no time limit; the estimated time necessary to analyze and complete the case is 1 hour.

Eligibility

Participants must be enrolled full-time students in the University of Findlay College of Health Professions or College of Pharmacy.

Judging

Judges will evaluate and score each team on the information presented in their submitted response and according to the criteria listed in the general rubric.

1st Place: \$50 gift card to each team member

2nd Place: \$25 gift card to each team member

3rd Place: \$25 gift card to each team member

General Rubric

Problem Identification and Prioritization

- Consideration of patient cultural, clinical, and socioeconomic factors
- Identification of the most urgent issue
- Identification of all patient needs

Cultural Competence

- Recognition of the potential problems facing various patient populations
- Development of treatment plan that addresses all patient needs
- Friendly and respectful treatment of all patients

Problem-solving skills

- Outreach into the community and special programs relating to populations/illnesses
- Level of patient care provided

Patient Interaction

- Involvement of the patient in decision-making in their own care
- Ability to communicate in a manner that the patient can understand and implement
