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Message from the Dean Grateful for our Oiler Pharmacy Family



The White Coat ceremony is an important milestone in each pharmacy student's career path. The size of our program and campus community allowed us to be nimble and creative. We are grateful to the UF community for its support in hosting the event, to CVS Health for providing sponsorship, and to the family and friends of these student pharmacists," said Parker. "This is the first pharmacy class to begin its professional level coursework and practice in the midst of a pandemic. They will persevere through this and many challenges in their professional careers, and I am very confident they have the grit and the skills to see them through."
