



Medication Therapy

Management Center Did you know that the University of Findlay College of Pharmacy has launched a Medication Therapy Management Center (MTM)? MTM services are distinct from medication dispensing by focusing on a patient-centered process of care. Services encompass the assessment and evaluation of the patient's complete medication therapy regimen, rather than focusing on an individual medication product. At Findlay's Medication Therapy Management (MTM) Center, students work with seven in-house pharmacists to provide one-on-one MTM services to patients. By interacting directly with the patient, our students gain experience in identifying unforeseen side-effects or problems with medication regimes and provide different drug recommendations as well as guidelines for identifying future issues and tips for taking medication. 

Story originally published September, 2017) The adventure began in summer 2016 for five students and two faculty members from the University of Findlay's (UF) College of Pharmacy. Visiting Kyushu University of Health and Welfare (KUHW) in Nobeoka, Japan was a true intercultural experience with the goal of comparing common pharmacy practices in the inpatient, outpatient and academic settings between Japan and the United States. Student representation included one member of each class from P2-P6.


how everyone learns.







Cleveland pharmacists visit underserved patients at home

Popular program helps keep patients on track with medication adherence, chronic disease management More than 15 pharmacists and residents work at The Centers for Family and Children in Cleveland, and a chunk of their day is spent visiting patients at home to help them with medication adherence and chronic disease management. Their clients have severe and persistent mental health issues and typically rely on Medicaid or are uninsured.



From Clinic to Classroom : UF Professor to Offer Parkinson's Course Approximately one million Americans currently live with Parkinson's Disease with 60,000 new

symptoms of resting tremors, slowness of movement and rigidity appear in geriatric patients for a variety of reasons and as there is no definitive diagnostic test, the misdiagnosis rate of Parkinson's is strikingly high, around 25 percent. To combat this issue, the National Parkinson's Foundation (NPF) has been advocating for an increase in research, patient care resources and training in diagnosis and care for physicians and pharmacists.
