Assistant Dean of Pharmacy Recognized for Work in the War Against Addiction

A decade ago, community leaders wouldn't have met to publicly discuss the progress they were (or weren't) making on the opioid crisis.

When the Hancock County Opioid and Addictions Task Force was formed in 2010, "nobody really wanted to recognize that there was a problem with opiates," said John Stanovich, the first chair of the task force, which was originally called the Hancock County Opiate Task Force.

Stanovich was among the speakers Thursday night at "The Opioid Crisis: Where Are We Now?" hosted by the UF due to the amazing program but quickly fell in love with the welcoming atmosphere, small class sizes, and dedicated teaching staff. Coming to UF has been the best decision. She has made life-long friends, met many role models for her future career, and they have encouraged her beyond belief in her education towards becoming a pharmacist.

"To all incoming freshman and anyone who is working towards a goal I say, do not stop here. Reach one goal, celebrate your victory, and find another one to strive towards. Take this opportunity at UF to step out of your comfort zone, try new things, and do not be afraid to make mistakes. Alumnus has Hot Career as Nuclear Pharmacist

The insistent clicking of Geiger counters and presence of heavy lead-lined equipment are as much a part of one Findlay alumnus' workdays as the white pharmacist coat he dons. That's because Kurt Hafeken, Pharm.D. '17, has a nontraditional but essential career

As a UF young alumn, Dr. John Roby (PharmD '15) is living in his hometown of Plain City, OH which is about 20 minutes west of Columbus. His wife Jen and he have two small children, Cora who is 2.5 years old and John who is 3 months old. The Roby household is definitely a busy one! John works for Kroger Pharmacy as a Pharmacy Practice Coordinator, where he supports 21 pharmacy teams in helping patients live healthier lives. Hafeken manages HeartLight Pharmacy Services' Toledo lab, which compounds radioactive medications used for various tests and treatments. Most of the medication HeartLight mixes are administered by syringe for testing during procedures such as nuclear heart scans, which inject a radioactive substance called a tracer that enables imaging of blood flow and coronary heart disease detection. But nuclear medicine's fascinating history, which dates back to Berkeley Lab's scientific innovations in the 1930s, also has led to successful medical interventions such as thyroid ablation, in which patients drink an "atomic cocktail" that targets the overactive gland and destroys part of it to combat afflictions such as Grave's Disease. Kappa Epsilon Flu Clinics:

This fall semester the College of Pharmacy collaborated with Kappa Epsilon, a professional pharmacy fraternity on campus, to provide a

The Immunization Initiative focuses on meeting the curricular educational objectives tied to the mission of the College of Pharmacy and allows students to engage in a real-life learning environment. This initiative allows pharmacy students from their first year to their fifth year to participate in the entire process which includes initial paperwork, preparation of vaccines, immunizing the patient, and completing follow up paperwork. This year's clinic was overseen by current P5, Katherine Howell, and pharmacist, Dr. Kate Alt. The clinic was able to establish and perform 9 clinic sites this flu season with over 200 vaccines given. The mobile flu clinic team traveled to these clinic sites from Toledo to Findlay, Ohio to provide vaccines in a convenient setting for the community served. A recipient from one of the clinics this year wrote "Very professional, on time, and friendly. All stations went smoothly from signing in to filling out paperwork and the shot itself. I couldn't ask for a better team". One addition to the clinic to this year compared to last year was the acquirement and utilization of high dose vaccines for individuals over 65 years old. Kappa Epsilon is excited to continue to work with the College of Pharmacy for the clinic in an effort to continue providing hands-on learning experiences for students
